Dear Friends,

What a year 2023 has been as we celebrated our seventh year together! For me, that meant a chance to take my first sabbatical in 23 years of ministry--a wonderful and deeply appreciated gift you all gave me. I was so grateful for everyone who stepped up to cover so many things in my absence during July and August. As you'll see in the Worship Team's report, we heard from a number of fascinating speakers over the summer exploring the themes of "living"



our faith in a complex world" and "exploring God through creativity and nature".

The year was also a difficult one for our church family. We had more funerals than any other year of my tenure here, losing a number of beloved friends. I am so grateful for the care our Deacons provided during these losses and to everyone who stepped up to help fill in the gaps.

A colleague of mine likes to note that simply turning the calendar page from one year to the next does not guarantee a new beginning. I agree with her sentiment, but there is a newness to the year that can remind us of the hope and possibility that lie ahead. Out of curiousity, I took a look at our membership database this morning. Since I arrived in November 2016, we have said "goodbye" to 55 people. 21 have died and the rest have moved or transferred or simply moved on. But in that same amount of time, we have welcomed 45 new people. In a church of around 150 members, that represents a significant change. I don't always notice the effect of small changes from day to day, but those numbers remind me that we are always being renewed, we are changing and growing from who we used to be into something new. And that is a sign of life.

I look forward to seeing what 2024 has in store for us. Joining our ideas, our resources, our enthusiam, and our energy together, I believe we can make a positive impact on our lives, our church, and our community. I'm excited to be a part of this work, and hope you are, too!




Worship and Music

Worship is at the heart of what we do. It is the event that brings the most of us together at the same time to wrestle thoughtfully with questions of life, calling, and God. We meditate, sing and pray together; we welcome everyone to worship with us just as they are—to love and be loved without exception. Around 30% of our budget supports FPCe's worship and music program including our pastor, music leadership team, and music interns..

Spiritual Formation

We come to FPCe to learn, to grow, to practice together a path of healing and wholeness for our-

selves and our world. Around 12% of our budget is directed toward educational programs and outreach, including events such as: Adult Forum; guest speakers and workshops; our church retreat at Holston Camp; Thursdays with Jesus book discussion group; and Wednesday evening Meditation Gathering. We also dedicate money toward funding a student intern program, giving us the opportunity to support and to learn from a new generation of spiritual leaders.



Service to the Community & World

Loaves and Fishes...Area Resource Minis-

try...Shepherd's Inn...Holston Camp...Boroko Village...Presbyterian Disaster Relief.....Living Waters for the World...ETSU UKirk Campus Ministry. Reaching out beyond our walls is a core part of our identity. About 13% of our budget supports this good work.

Care and Engagement

Through our Deacons' ministry of care, through the work of our Community Life team facilitating fellowship opportunities, and through countless acts of love and kindness, FPCe strives to offer love, comfort, and hope to everyone in our church family. And we grow closer through much-loved events in the church calendar, such as Dinner on the Grounds, Progressive Dinner, Gratitude Luncheon, an annual retreat, monthly BEANedictions, and other events, we commit around 10% of the budget to support care and engagement of our members.

Facilities


About 20% of FPCe's budget ensures that we have a safe, sound, and beautiful place to worship, study, and celebrate together. But our facility also does so much more! In addition to providing a space for varied congregational activities, the building is also used by numerous community groups, including: the LGBTQIA+ Social Gathering; Catholic worship with Fr. Michael; Friends of Roan Mountain; yoga and exercise classes; Carter Co. Democratic Women's panel; Shepherd's Inn; Assistance & Resource Ministry; AA/NA meetings, and East TN Alzheimer's Support Group.

Administration

Administration includes all the behind the scenes support that makes everything else we do possible. Around 15% of our budget goes to cover the countless things that need to happen for our church to operate, including all kinds of things like: accounting, bulletins, website and social media presence, live-streaming for Sunday worship, weddings, and funerals, Zoom accounts for meetings, meditation, and Adult Forum, and a support staff to make it all happen.

Building & Grounds Report

Building and Grounds (B&G) held a Beanediction in August with the Peacemaking Committee. The HVAC was serviced in the summer, and the furnace was repaired late Fall. Paul Gabinet coordinated with S. B. White 323-926-8127. We scheduled three (3) work days to maintain the grounds. In addition, Mike Rose, Richard Brosmore, and Charles Faust removed the leaves from the property in the Fall 23, as well as trimmed the hedges and bushes in the front of the church. The gutters and downspouts of the church were cleaned twice, once in the Spring and once in late Fall after most of the leaves were down. This is contracted with O'Healy Services, 423-900-



2929, to be done on a regular, yearly basis. One dead tree was removed and a large limb overhanging a neighboring property was also removed. Lumberjacks Tree Service, 423-895-9658, did both jobs. In addition, the large Elm Tree by the parking lot is infected with Dutch Elm Disease and will be removed by Lumberjacks early this year. Jim Miller has agreed to cut up the trunk for lumber to make an as yet to be determined piece of art/furniture (Charles Faust) for the church. There is also a River Birch tree next to the back porch that is half dead and needs to be removed at the same time the Elm tree is removed. The ceiling light bulbs in the sanctuary have been replaced. Paul Waters, 423-512-0227. A metal cap for the building's chimney has been prepared and will be installed soon to prevent water damage from rain by Paul Waters. The committee met with a representative from Southern Mutual Church Insurance Company in December for the purpose of establishing our insurance premium for the coming

year. A major issue is the age of the roof. The amount of the premium will, in part, depend on when it was last replaced and documentation is needed. The B & G committee is planning to meet with Steve Sykes in the coming weeks to determine what repairs need to be done of the soffits and facia boards as well as the Steeple. Paul Gabinet is coordinating this.

Community Life Report

Beanediction: This informal social coffee event is held after church on the second Sunday of most months that do not have a major event going on. Each one is hosted by a different committee moderator and their team. It represents an opportunity to extend our time together in casual fel-lowship after worship. This is the first full year after Covid that it has been held. There were 8 beanedictions this year with all committees participating.

Dinner For Eight: Our dinners resumed this year after Covid in May. We had three host families welcome approximately eight guests into their homes for a meal with the hosts providing the entrée and the guests bringing the sides. We had a total of 23 participants and hope to have multiple dinners in 2024.

Dinner On the Grounds: The dinner is held in the fall when we can still set up tables outside and enjoy our beautiful trees and fall colors. This year the dinner was held the second Sunday in Sep-tember and the weather was not at its best so the tables were set up in Martin Hall. The church provided sandwiches and desserts and the congregation brought sides to share. There was around 40 people in attendance.

Gratitude Dinner: In appreciation of our church family, our community sponsored a lunch after church on the second Sunday in November. Our committee provided a barbeque with all the trimmings and some vegetarian options. Approximately 40 participants shared what they were grateful for and enjoyed fellowship.

Christmas Dinner: Our annual Christmas Dinner was held on December 17th in the evening. At 5:30 we started with our traditional Wassail bowl with dinner following. The committee provided two hams with the congregation bringing sides. We had music performed by Teresa Rose and

Paul Gabone led everyone in a rousing Twelve Days of Christmas. The evening ended with a celebration of Holy Communion led by Paster Brian. There were 32 people in attendance.

Progressive Dinner: Our progressive dinner returned after the Covid years on Dec 31st, New Years Eve. The date change seemed to be a big hit and we made our way around to our three hosts houses for the Appetizer, Entrée and Dessert portions of the evening. We had 22 in attendance to celebrate the New Year.

Community Outreach Report

he Community Outreach team seeks to encourage and coordinate outreach to the local community. This is done largely through the following local agencies and ministries: ARM (Assistance and Resources Ministry), Loaves and Fishes (formerly known as Food for the Multitude), and the Shepherd's Inn (the community's only safe house / emergency shelter for women and their children escaping from domestic violence settings and temporary homelessness).

Our Loaves and Fishes ministry has continues to get tremendous support from our congregation! We have twenty people who have provided casseroles over the last year. In partnership with Brown's Chapel in Elizabethton, we try to provide 15 to 20 casseroles one Friday each month. The Shepherd's Inn continues to provide safe housing under the leadership of Paul Gabinet. We still currently have just one volunteer from First Presbyterian working with ARM. Our facilities and parking lot were once again used for ARM's yard sale in 2023.

Minute for Mission. Niko Watts-Armstrong did a Minute for Mission to introduce the congregation to the work of PRISM, a teen LGBTQIA+ support group for the Tri-Cities.

TriPride. More Light organized First Presbyterian's participation the annual TriPride parade and shared a booth with Covenant Presbyterian.

Service Projects. The committee is currently exploring possible service projects with several community organizations.

Peacemaking Report


The Peacemaking Team's goal is to help enable the church to extend God's peace to individuals, communities, and Earth. The following activities were undertaken during the year to work toward this goal:

• Maintained the Peacemaking table in the upstairs hall serves as a center for information and communication (e.g., collections and cards for Alternative Giving);

• Received a grant in the amount of \$979.73 from the Holston Presbytery's Internation-

al Hunger Fund which supported Boroko Village;

- Posted environmental and peace information on Facebook and in church email:
- Offered excess produce, plants, and gardening tools/supplies throughout the summer at our Green Table, generating monies for Green Congregation projects;
- Collected recyclable materials from church activities;
- Conducted Wheel of the Year meditations with volunteers from the congregation during worship for equinoxes and solstices.
- Wrote postcards protesting local processing of uranium for weapons production and joined a related in-person protest;
- Raised \$737.64 on May 21st, through our Pies for Peace event, for Boroko Village;



- Co-hosted BEANediction on August 13 with the Building & Grounds committee, raising an additional \$115 for the food crisis around Boroko Village;
- Carol Landis presented to Adult Forum in the new Science & Religion series honoring Julie Wade about permitted releases of radioactive materials into the air and into the Nolichucky River;
- Hosted the NE Tennessee URI (United Religions Initiative) Cooperation Circle's Gratitude Dinner on November 18;
- Conducted our annual Alternative Giving campaign during December, benefiting Boroko Village (\$690) and Shepherd's Inn (\$1325).

Stewardship, Finance, and Personnel

he 2023 annual report of the Stewardship, Finance and Personnel (SFP) Committee.

Stewardship

The SFP conducted the 2024 annual Stewardship campaign this past fall with the goal of 50 pledges in the amount of \$160,000. At the time of this report, there are 50 pledges in the amount of \$153,275. For comparison, we had the same \$160,000 goal for 2023 and received \$157,458 in pledges. A huge shout-out of appreciation to all those who made a pledge.

Finance

The SFP submitted the 2024 budget to the session. The approved budget is found elsewhere in this report. It is worth noting that the budget is not a plan of expenditure but is rather an aspirational document reflecting what we hope to achieve in the coming year.

Total expenditures for 2023 were \$217,815 against \$207,938 in revenue. The shortfall was covered by savings from previous years.

The SFP was commissioned by the Session in 2022 to work toward moving the Tom Dixon Trust to a new trustee. This effort has required the services of attorneys. The process and its complications are nearly completed.

The church has been named as the beneficiary of a portion of the estate of Julie Wade following her passing this fall. The amount of the bequest will be determined following the settling of the estate and the actions of probate. The proceeds will be used to further the work of the church. We are particularly grateful for Julie's thoughtfulness and generosity.

Personnel

During the year Elaine Kolp agreed to return to the church to assist with finances on a contractual basis. The Session has named her as the church Treasurer, a position she held in her previous employment. Scott Gurdak's responsibilities have been expanded to include many of the administrative duties in the church office. We are lucky to have these talented individuals on our staff.

The Worship/Sanctuary Team maintains the 'elements of worship' and the proper environment to enhance worship that include providing the means to create and preserve sacred space, providing pulpit supply, meaningful ritual, and an inspiring, creative, reverent experience for all who gather to worship." (excerpt from Manual of Operation—revised 2022)

During 2023, the Worship/Sanctuary Team provided the regular tasks of changing the paraments in accordance with the "liturgical calendar", supplying, setting up the monthly and special communion services, facilitating the Advent Soup Supper/Hanging of the Greens, and hosting the October Bean-a-diction.

This past year, the Pastor observed a summer sabbatical as stipulated by the Presbytery. The Worship/Sanctuary Team also has the responsibility of providing pulpit supply. At a luncheon meeting at the home of Paul Gabinet, the Team (Sue Farthing, Carol Ann McElwee, Jill Oxendine, Rebecca Nunley, Joan Denney, Roddy Bird, Bobbie Connelly [Session Liaison], and the Rev. Dr. Brian Wyatt) began the task of planning to meet the needs for pulpit supply.

Digital Outreach Ministry

2 023 was a very busy and exciting year for the Digital Multimedia Outreach Committee. As in-person church services continued to grow, the committee continued to live-stream our Sunday services for those who could not attend. The team also coordinates the audiovisual systems throughout the church facility, and is responsible for set-up and maintenance of those

systems. Streaming utilizes our in-house digital audio & video hardware and software systems. The service is broadcast live via our YouTube channel. Our team works hard to make it look easy, however, it takes a coordinated effort of quite a few volunteers each week to successfully provide this service. This past year we were able to weed-out obsolete or broken equipment, including 3 wireless microphones (so old they no longer were in compliance with FCC radio broadcast frequencies), broken cables, and damaged multimedia devices. We were fortunate enough to have a technology grant to purchase 3 new Sennheiser EWD wireless microphone systems which have proven to work beautifully in our environment, especially with the many vocal talents that we have in our choir. As our existing equipment continues to age out of usability, we will continue to upgrade our systems as possible in 2024. We are always looking for more volunteers to join our team, and will train you to provide this great service! To volunteer, please reach out to scott@fpcelizabethton.org.

- * Our most popular viewed service was from April 23, 2023, with 321 views.
